


An Afternoon With Moras Shubert

I recently spent an afternoon with longtime resident and near centurion Moras Shubert. Moras is one of University Park's oldest living residents, having lived in the same house on south Columbine for over 65 years. When we visited, he reflected upon the changes he and his wife Erne have witnessed over the years since they first moved to the neighborhood. They purchased their home in 1946 after he accepted a position as a professor of Botany at the University of Denver.

At that time, most of the houses in University Park were much smaller in contrast to the many large homes of today. He recalls the wonderful estate that extended from Monroe to Colorado Blvd. and Warren to Evans where pheasants and other wildlife roamed freely. Moras also remembers the spur of the Colorado and Southern Railroad, which ran along the stretch of land now called the Buchtel Trail, extending from University to Colorado Blvd.

Moras was instrumental in founding the Botanical Gardens where he served as one of the original trustees and was secretary of the board until 1998. The Denver Botanical Gardens benefited from Moras' vast knowledge of all things botanical. When Erne passed away this past April, family and friends

celebrated her life with music and stories at the Denver Botanic Gardens.

Moras also helped develop the Buchtel Trail, and designed the plantings up and down the trail. He still consults with University Park's Community Council on matters affecting the trail.

Moras' and Erne's home was always a "beehive" of activity during his years as a DU professor, where students received a warm welcome and engaged in lively discussions. The Shuberts also opened their home to students who were in need of temporary housing. Moras still maintains this "open door" policy, and invites former students and friends to stop over at his home.

Mark your calendars for May 21, 2012, the day when Moras will celebrate his 100th birthday. He would enjoy cards from his University Park neighbors. 

Safer Intersection — Larger Park

The Better Denver Bond project at Buchtel and South Columbine has created a four-way intersection, much safer than the former five-way intersection. The bond project enlarged the park by merging the closed area of East Jewell Avenue to Buchtel Centennial Park. The project also added a new sidewalk, along with plantings of native grasses throughout the park. The southeast corner of Buchtel and South Columbine was also realigned to match the angle of Buchtel Parkway, and a new sidewalk, streetlight, and fire hydrant were added. We were told that the decision to use concrete (rather than the plantings we requested) along Buchtel Parkway was made to save on water and maintenance costs.

Pork, White Bean And Kale Stew Recipe For Cold Winter Nights

Courtesy of Michelle Morris Serves 6-8

3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

2 pounds pork, cubed

2 teaspoons paprika

1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper, or more if needed

2 large onions, diced

8 cloves garlic, minced

1/2 cup white wine, optional

4 cups beef stock

4 cups diced tomatoes, with juice

10 cups kale, leaves only, chopped

2 cans cannellini beans, drained and rinsed

salt and pepper, to taste Parmesan cheese, optional, for

topping

cheese if desired.

Heat oil in a large heavy pot over medium high heat. Add pork and cook until lightly browned. Add paprika and cayenne and continue to cook, stirring, for about two minutes. Add onions and garlic and cook until slightly soft. Add wine to deglaze pan, the stock, tomatoes and kale, stirring until kale begins to soften enough so that it can be submerged in the cooking liquid. Cover, reduce heat, and simmer for 15 minutes. Add beans and simmer for a couple more minutes to heat through. Salt and pepper to taste. Serve topped with a little Parmesan
